# The Curious Cat's Adventures at Haydonleigh

## Foundation Stage

POW! It's been Super Hero week in Foundation Stage! Role play areas have become Super Hero Headquarters and the children have been creating their own amazing Super Heroes by adding collage features and outfits to potatoes and wooden spoons.

The children turned bin liners into amazing capes and wrote descriptions of their favourite hero. We had a wonderful time with our families who joined us for 'Crash in for a Comic', writing and illustrating our own comic books together. ### Year 1

This week the children are considering the rafts and the clay models they made last week and evaluating them. I always find it hard to evaluate because I'm so puturfect! In English they have been busy planning and writing their final hot task which is to get creative and write their very own story for the first time. I can't wait to read them! In Maths the children have been learning about positional language. Feel free to help them practise which is their left and right paw at home.
