The Governing Body takes seriously its responsibility under section 175 of the Education Act 2002 to safeguard and promote the welfare of children, and to work together with other agencies to ensure adequate arrangements are in place within our school to safeguard pupils in our care. - To raise awareness of all staff of Safeguarding procedures and of Safeguarding areas of responsibility

All safeguarding concerns will be investigated, recorded and reported as necessary.

If you use external clubs eg Big A can you inform them also. Please work with us to keep all children safe – it is important that we know where they are at all times.

Foundation Stage

What an amazing time we have been having in Foundation Stage this week. The children had a wonderful time with their parents who joined us for 'Pop in for a Poppy' and created beautiful poppies together. It was so lovely watching the children and grown-ups working together and to see how proud the children were of their school. We were also very grateful for the children who generously gave money for Pudsey Bear and the Children in Need charity – the children wrote letters to Pudsey explaining how they would like their money to be used and enjoyed a fabulous spotty day!

Year 1

This week the children have been thinking about using describing words in their sentences. They have also been deciding whether the pig, the cat, the rat and the little red hen are good friends or not. In Topic children have been naming the countries in the United Kingdom and finding them on a map. In Science the children have gathered data about the class's favourite fruits and presented the information in a graph. In Maths the children have been looking at and naming 3D shapes. I'm sure they would love to go on a 3D shape hunt around the house to show you what they know. I hope they find some cylinder shaped tins of tuna for me!

Year 2

On the first Monday morning after half term, Year 2 had a visitor. What a rude, disgusting, smelly and vile woman she was! Her name was Mrs Twit. Year 3

What a busy week in year 3. Children have been learning lots of interesting facts about osprey as part of their English work I am not sure I like the sound of those hooked bills and razor sharp talons, though, although I do agree with their delicious diet of fish, fish and more fish!
