KS2 SATs results in comparison to the statistical first release are looking very good, with our school above the National Average in all areas.

KS1 SATs results all show increased scores from last year and should all remain above the Swindon average. No local or National data is available for comparison yet.

Foundation Stage Good Level of Development has increased from 63% last year to 78% - awesome!

The year 1 phonic screening score has also significantly improved by a huge 15% this year!

In-house data for other year groups also shows many year on year improvements as we continue to master the delivery and assessment of the new curriculum.
