Foundation Stage

We are all excited to be back in Foundation Stage and have a busy term ahead. We have been celebrating the amazing festival of Diwali and exploring the wonderful traditions that take place. We are also excited about Bonfire Night and have been using the percussion instruments to create our own firework sounds – we have definitely returned back to school with a bang!

Year 1

As I was taking a nap in the Year One corridor, I noticed that things look a little different around there. With the start of the new term, children have come out of transition and are busy learning lots of new things. This term they will be finding out all about their senses and about who Louis Braille was. In English they will be looking at two different stories across the term, The Little Red Hen and Charlie's Superhero Underpants. This will be helping them to write recounts and a description of a setting. In Maths the children will be learning calculation skills such as addition and subtraction. Soon they will be going on their local area walk, using their senses to make observations. It is sure to be a busy term!

Year 2

He had come to tell the children all about his job working on the railways at the Swindon Railway Village. Year 3
